Arts Meets History Expands in 2025 with Three New Banners

With the backing of the Historical and Landmarks Commission (HLC), the dedication of the HLC "Art Meets History" subcommittee Commissioners Kirby, Romano and Vargas-Smith, and collaboration of artist Cameryn Baker, this innovative project was successfully launched to support HLC educational priorities for 2024 and beyond. These collective efforts have brought the history of our community to life through captivating public artwork in the colorful style reminiscent of Franklin Delano Roosevelt's 1935 Work Progress Administration (WPA) Federal Art Project. The project launched in 2024 with 10 banners highlighting some of Santa Clara's most well-known historic places.

In 2025, the program expanded to include three additional banners, with displays now on El Camino Real and Great America Parkway.

Residents and visitors are encouraged to take a stroll and admire the banners—a wonderful way to engage with the community's rich history. Each banner visually contributes to ongoing conversations about the historic preservation of our heritage.


The banners can be viewed along El Camino Real and Great America Parkway throughout the month of May.
