



Overview

BACKGROUND

- The City of Santa Clara receives approximately \$1.7M annually in entitlement funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to benefit low-income households
 - The Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) funds affordable housing and public facility improvements, and public services.
 - The HOME program can fund rental assistance to prevent homelessness and housing production
- Every 5 years, the City must develop a Consolidated Plan (5-Year Plan) that studies community needs and sets broad goals for the years ahead
- Every year, the City must develop an Annual Action Plan to detail how the city will spend funds in response to the 5-Year Plan goals
- This year, the Santa Clara County selected Root Policy, a consultant, to conduct regional outreach and analysis, and to prepare plans for each entitlement City
- Public hearings on April 8 + May 13



Overview

Comments from Public Hearing #1

- Five Public Service Agencies appeared and spoke in support of funding their agencies
- Four additional public service agencies submitted written comments/letters of support
- One member of the public commented that he thinks the federal government will cut funding.
- · Council Member Chahal asked if there was a backup plan if HUD funding is cut
- Councilmembers Hardy and Jain asked clarifying questions about TBRA.
- Council Member Park asked if agencies can use Public Service and Capital Improvement dollars.
- No additional public comments were received.


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


Overview

Goals for 2025-2030

- Affordable Housing: Development, rehabilitation, rental assistance
- Homelessness: Affordable housing, case management, connection to services
- Public Services: Basic needs services for lower income/special needs households
- Fair Housing: Promote fair housing choice through education, testing, mediation
- Public Facility Improvements: Sidewalks, traffic calming, and other improvements
- Administration & Planning: Management, planning, monitoring








Council Action

Recommendation

- Note and File Public Comment on the 2025-2030 Final Consolidated Plan and FY 25/26 Annual Action Plan for U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Funds.
- 2. Approve the 2025-2030 Final Consolidated Plan and FY 25-26 Annual Action Plan, in the forms presented, and direct staff to summarize and include all public comments to be submitted to HUD within sixty (60) days after receiving allocation notice.
- 3. Delegate authority to the City Manager or designee to execute all agreements and amendments that exceed the City's \$250,000 threshold for federal and local funding that is allocated through the City Council's adoption of the FY 25/26 Annual Action Plan in final forms approved by the City Attorney.

Annual Action Plan Contingency Language for CDBG

Higher than expected

If the City receives <u>more</u> Entitlement funding than expected, funds will be used for the City Homeowner Rehabilitation Program (i.e. NCIP) and/or the Minor Repair Program. The City reserves the option to provide more funding for public services if the Public Service Cap allows for another agency to be funded to at least \$30,000.

Lower than expected

If the City receives <u>less</u> Entitlement funding than expected, the Public Service and Admin Caps will be recalculated and amounts adjusted. If the recalculation results in a Public Service Cap of less than \$180,000, the City will need to reduce its number of Public Service Agencies accordingly to come under the Public Service Cap. The agency(ies) that scored lowest during the NOFA process will be cut first. Further, the amount allocated to the Minor Repair Program may need to be reduced. All Program Income is placed in the Revolving Loan Fund for use in the NCIP program.



Annual Action Plan Contingency Language for HOME

Higher than expected

If the City receives <u>more</u> Entitlement funding than expected, the Administration amounts will be recalculated. All remaining funds will be used for the TBRA program.

Lower than expected

If the City receives <u>less</u> Entitlement funding than expected, the Administration amounts will be recalculated. The TBRA program will then be reduced in funding.

NOFA for Public Service Agencies

- Public Service Agency (PSA) submissions were ranked based on:
 - Proposed activity being a HIGH priority;
 - Agency's years of service;
 - Amount of funds leveraged;
 - The majority of beneficiaries served being either extremely low or very low income; and
 - The agency's history of drawing funds down.

- January 31, 2025 NOFA for Public Service Agency proposals released
- March 4, 2025
 Applications Due
- April 8, 2025
 Recommendations to Council

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Federal Funding Programs

- CDBG: Community Development Block Grants
 - Eligible Uses:
 - · Acquisition of Real Property
 - Construction of Public Facilities and Improvements
 - Public Services (limited to 15% of Grant)
 - · Rehabilitation of Residential and Non-Residential Structures
 - · Activities related to Energy Conservation and Renewable Energy Sources
 - · Relocation and Demolition
 - Economic Development
 - Planning/Administration for Program (limited to 20% of allocation)

Federal Funding Programs

- · CDBG: Community Development Block Grants
 - National Objectives: (Must meet at least 1)
 - 1. Benefit low-and moderate-income persons (LMI)
 - 2. Prevent or eliminate slum or blight
 - 3. Meet urgent community development needs
 - Eligible Beneficiaries:
 - Not less than 70% of CDBG funds must be used for activities that benefit low- and moderate-income persons.

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Federal Funding Programs

- HOME: The HOME Investment Partnerships Program
 - Eligible Uses:
 - Providing direct rental assistance and security deposits to low-income people
 - Building, buying, and/or rehabilitating affordable housing for rent or homeownership
 - Flexible; can be used as grants, direct loans, loan guarantees or other forms
 of credit enhancements
