

COVID-19 LEGISLATIVE UPDATE FOR APRIL 5 - MAY 9, 2021

April 6, 2021 Update

- California to Move Past the County Tier System: Earlier today, Governor Newsom announced that the State's next step in the COVID-19 pandemic recovery includes moving beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy, which is the system that places counties into colored tiers. This move is based on that fact that California has administered 20 million vaccines, including 4 million to the hardest-hit communities.
 - The State aims to fully reopen on June 15, and will continue to require wearing masks and encourage all Californians to get vaccinated. Two criteria must be met in order to fully reopen the economy, which the entire state would do as a whole:
 - Vaccine supply must be sufficient for Californians 16 years and older who wish to be inoculated; and
 - Hospitalization rates must be stable and low
 - There are still Cal/OSHA standards and requirements that exist. The Governor's administration has stated they will coordinate with Cal/OSHA to try and have regulations as aligned as possible.
 - The state is still considering whether high risk activities/venues will need to require vaccination for attendees if they increase to full capacity. However, there will be a pathway for non-vaccinated people to attend high risk activities/venues via testing.
 - The 2 exceptions to full re-opening will be:
 - Conventions, which will be held to 5,000 people, unless there is a system to testing attendees.
 - Large outdoor events (that do not have fixed seating) such as music festivals. Guidance is still being formed on this and similar events.
 - Additional information and updated guidance/FAQs will be put out in the coming days.

- Federal Infrastructure and Stimulus Plan: This week, the Senate parliamentarian ruled that the annual budget resolution can be revised to include new reconciliation instructions, which frees up Democrats to pass more than one bill under reconciliation rules each year.
 - As a reminder, these bills can't be filibustered but they are guided by a set of restrictions, most notably the Byrd Rule, which prohibits non-budgetary policies from being included.
 - This was used to pass the first stimulus bill under the Biden Administration, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)
 - If the annual budget resolution can be revised once, it can be revised again. So theoretically, Democrats may choose to use the tool as often as they



want, which allows them to not need Republican votes as long as the party all votes in favor.

- **FEMA COVID-19 Funeral Costs:** FEMA announced it will provide financial support to offset the cost of funeral services for COVID-19 victims.
 - The financial support is available for individuals who died in the US from COVID-19 (documented on the death certificate) after January 20, 2020, and while applicants must be US citizens or residents, there is no citizenship or residency requirement for the deceased individuals.
 - FEMA is offering up to \$9,000 per funeral, and applicants can submit requests for multiple COVID-19 victims, up to \$35,500 per application.
 - Some of the funding for this program was allocated in the December 2020 federal COVID-19 relief package, which provided \$2 billion to FEMA to cover funeral costs for COVID-19 victims in 2020.

April 9, 2021 Update¹

- ARPA State and Local Funding: TPA participated in a call with the White House and
 the Department of Treasury this week to discuss the state and local funding contained
 within the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Treasury indicated that they are working
 to publish final funding allocations, as well as the implementation guidance, by the end
 of April.
- American Families Plan: The White House said that Biden will propose an American Families Plan as soon as this month. This Plan would be in addition to the infrastructure proposal, the American Jobs Plan, released by the Biden Administration last week.
 - Among other provisions, the American Families Plan will include expanded benefits for child care, as well as health-related measures.
 - Some Democrats have called for both proposals to be wrapped into one large package, as there is a concern that there will not be enough time, and political capital, to pass two multitrillion-dollar pieces of legislation so recently after the passage of the \$1.9 trillion ARPA.
- **HOME Supplemental Funds:** Yesterday, HUD announced the allocation of \$5 billion in American Rescue Plan funds to help communities across the country create affordable housing and services for people experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness.
 - The City of Santa Clara will receive \$1,604,104
 - The supplemental funding is allocated through the HOME Investment Partnerships Program to 651 grantees, including states, insular areas, and local governments. A full list is attached, including allocations to the state and counties².
 - Funding can be used for development of affordable housing, tenant-based rental assistance, supportive services, and acquisition and development of noncongregate shelter units.
 - o Funds must be spent by 2030.
 - HOME-ARP funding is the first of two homelessness-related funding opportunities from the American Rescue Plan that HUD will release.

- o In the coming weeks, HUD will announce the allocation of funding for emergency vouchers for people experiencing and at-risk of homelessness.
- Governor Newsom and Legislative Leaders Announce Early Budget Action for Wildfire Prevention: Yesterday, Governor Gavin Newsom, Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins (D-San Diego) and Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon (D-Lakewood) announced a \$536 million funding plan to help improve California's resilience to wildfires.
 - The \$536 million funding packaging includes \$125 million from Greenhouse Gas Reduction Funds and \$411 million from the General Fund. The Administration and Legislature also hope to draw federal disaster prevention grants to match money spent on home hardening.
 - Key parts of the Administration's initial proposal have been supplemented by legislative ideas that will pay dividends over the years, such as greater investments in forest health projects, improvements on defensible space, home hardening against fires, fire prevention grants, and prevention workforce training.
 - The plan includes public and private lands vegetation management, community-focused efforts for prevention and resilience and economic stimulus for the forestry economy.
 - The funding package's fiscal and programmatic details are outlined in Senate Bill
 85 and Assembly Bill 79, respectively.

April 13, 2021 Update

- Governor Newsom Signs Early Budget Action Package on Wildfires: Today, the
 Governor signed a \$536 million wildfire package enabling the state to take urgent action
 on projects that support wildfire suppression, improve forest health, and build resilience
 in communities to help protect residents and property from catastrophic wildfires in
 diverse landscapes across the state.
 - Today's package, which was signed into law via <u>Senate Bill 85</u>, invests in wildfire resilience projects including forest management, fuel breaks, and hardening infrastructure in high-risk communities, amongst other critical areas.
 - This package builds on the Governor's announcement last week of an expanded state task force to deliver on key commitments of the Wildfire and Forest Resilience Action Plan. Additionally, the package builds upon the \$80.74 million in emergency funds for 1,399 additional firefighters with CAL FIRE to bolster fuels management and wildfire response efforts which Governor Newsom authorized in March.
- State Lifts Capacity Limits on Places of Worship: In response to recent judicial rulings, the California Department of Public Health has revised the state's restrictions on church worship during the coronavirus pandemic, changing the capacity limits from mandates to recommendations.
 - Under the revisions, the State recommends that counties in the purple tier should strongly discourage indoor activities and should be limited to 25%; in the Red Tier indoor activities should be limited to 25% capacity; in the Orange and Yellow Tiers indoor activities should be limited to 50%.
- Child Tax Credit Portal: The IRS is on track to open an online portal to manage recent changes to the Child Tax Credit by July 1

- The latest pandemic relief package (Public Law 117-2) temporarily expanded the Child Tax Credit and directed the IRS to deliver advanced payments of the 2021 credit beginning July 1, instead of having individuals claim a lump sum on their tax return next filing season.
- It also tasked the agency with developing an online portal that would allow people to opt out of the advanced payments and update information that can affect credit eligibility and amount.
- Meals for the Homeless: This week, the USDA announced that young adults under the age of 25 experiencing homelessness will now be able to receive meals at emergency shelters participating in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP).
 - CACFP is a federal program that provides child care centers, day care homes, and adult day care centers reimbursements for nutritious meals and snacks they serve to eligible children and adults enrolled at their facilities. CACFP also provides reimbursements for meals served to children and youth participating in afterschool care programs, children living in emergency shelters, and adults over the age of 60 or living with a disability and enrolled in day care facilities.
 - Under normal circumstances, USDA only reimburses shelters for meals served to children, through age 18, but the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act expanded several nutrition assistance programs to reach the most vulnerable populations experiencing food hardship due to the pandemic, including homeless young adults.

April 23, 2021 Update

- California Law Passed to Rehire Workers Laid Off During COVID-19: Last Friday,
 Governor Newsom signed Senate Bill 93, which will require certain employers including
 hotels, large event centers and airports, as well as janitorial, security and maintenance
 workers at commercial buildings, to offer jobs first to the former workers they laid off
 during the coronavirus pandemic when rehiring.
 - In order to qualify, one would have to have been employed by their employer for at least six months in 2019. If multiple workers qualify for one position, the bill would require companies to rehire based on seniority.
 - Companies would have to offer jobs within five business days of establishing a position. Once offered, workers would then have five business days to decide whether they want to accept it.
- CDC Advisory Committee Recommends Resuming use of J&J Vaccine: Earlier today, a federal advisory panel of health experts voted to recommend the CDC resume use of the Johnson & Johnson single use vaccine, 10 days after federal health officials recommended the pause.
 - The CDC and FDA must still issue their own decision on whether to life or continue the pause. That guidance could come at any time, and several experts have recommended that the CDC and FDA act quickly now that a thorough review has shown that clotting complications are exceedingly rare.
 - Governor Newsom did not immediately respond to the advisory panel recommendation; however, his Administration has been quick to follow the guidance of the CDC and FDA. Should those bodies permit for the resumption of use of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine, it is likely that California would act in a similar fashion.

- California currently has approximately 1.2 million doses of the J&J vaccine in inventory that could be immediately administered if the pause is lifted.
- **GOP Infrastructure Plan:** This week senior Senate Republicans proposed a \$568 billion infrastructure plan to counter President Biden's \$2.25 trillion jobs package.
 - The overall plan is significantly narrower than the President's plan, focusing mostly on transportation infrastructure, broadband, and water projects.
 - Their plan includes:
 - \$299 billion for roads and bridges
 - \$61 billion for public transit
 - \$20 billion for rail
 - \$44 billion for airports
 - \$7 billion for water ports
 - \$65 billion for broadband
 - \$13 billion for safety agencies like NHTSA, FMCSA, and PHMSA
 - The plan describes the principles about how the bill should be paid for but is sparse on specifics.
 - It calls for repurposing unused federal funding from previous Covid relief bills, using "financing tools" and spending from the private sector, and unspecified user fees.
 - It specifically opposes rolling back 2017 GOP tax cuts and/or adding to the national debt.
- **School Lunches:** USDA announced this week that it would extend pandemic flexibilities for schools and daycare facility lunches, making all K-12 lunches free through spring 2022.
 - The effort attempts to reach more than 12 million youths experiencing food insecurity.
 - Child nutrition program waivers were implemented at the beginning of the pandemic and have allowed schools to adapt programs to better meet the children's needs.
- **Summer School:** Educators nationwide are planning for huge boosts in summer school enrollment this year. ARPA set aside \$1.2 billion that states, districts, and schools must use to facilitate summer programming for students.
 - This comes after more than a full school year of pandemic learning that saw students uprooted from the classroom and onto computer screens.
 - Attracting qualified teachers remains as perhaps the most challenging hurdle in getting these programs up and running. Some states and school districts have proposed increasing hourly pay by significant amounts.
- Rural Broadband: Earlier this week, House Agriculture Committee Chairman David Scott (D-GA) has called for comprehensive rural broadband legislation to come to fruition by the end of 2021.
 - o Rural expansion could cost anywhere from \$60 billion to \$150 billion. President Biden proposed \$100 billion for rural broadband in his infrastructure plan.

April 28, 2021 Update

- American Families Plan: Today, the Biden administration announced the details of the \$1.8 trillion America Families Plan. President Biden will address a joint session of Congress tonight and is expected to speak about the plan at length.
 - Its primary goal is to expand access to preschool, community colleges, childcare, and other healthcare benefits
 - O Here some of the key provisions:
 - \$225 billion for the creation of a national paid family and medical leave program
 - \$225 billion for investments into childcare
 - \$200 billion for universal pre-k
 - \$109 billion for tuition-free community college to all Americans, including Dreamers
 - \$85 billion to increase maximum Pell Grant awards by \$1,400
 - \$62 billion to support evidence-based completion and retention strategies at community colleges
 - Child tax credit and earned income tax credited expanded during the pandemic will be made permanent
 - The White House indicated that such a proposal will be paid by increasing the capital gains tax, implementing a higher top income tax rate, and increased IRS auditing enforcement on high-income businesses/individuals
- CDC Eases Outdoor Mask Guidance for Vaccinated: The Center for Disease Control
 announced on Tuesday that it would be easing its guidelines on the wearing of masks
 outdoors.
 - Fully vaccinated Americans do not need to cover their faces unless they are in a big crowd of strangers, according to the CDC
 - More than half of all US adults have received at least one does of coronavirus vaccine
 - CDC Director Rochelle Walensky pointed to the decline in COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations, and deaths and research showing that less than 10% of transmission happened outdoors
 - President Joe Biden and other experts have used the relaxing of restrictions as a reward and motivator for more individuals to receive vaccinations
- Federal Reserve Holds Rates Near Zero: In a statement released after its two-day policy meeting, the Fed identified vaccination progress and "strong policy support" as key factors in improving economic activity and employment.
 - While they expressed optimism about future economic recovery, they said they were not yet ready to scale back pandemic support.
 - Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell held a press conference today to discuss the decision with the media.
- Senate Budget Plan on Water: Earlier today, the Senate released their Budget Plan on Drought, Safe Drinking Water, Water Supply Reliability and Ratepayer Assistance. This proposal includes \$3.41 billion in one-time state and federal funds for a number of water, drinking water, and water supply programs.
 - Included in the Senate Plan is a proposal to appropriate \$1 billion in American Recovery Act funds to the Department of Community Services and Development

- to help utility customers and utilities address backlogged bills and arrearages associated with COVID economic impacts. This action will include trailer bill language (not yet released) that designates the agency and process for disbursement of ratepayer relief funds.
- The Senate Budget Committee will consider the proposal, not yet contained in a bill, at a hearing tomorrow morning.
- Neither the Governor's Office, nor the Assembly, have yet weighed in on the Senate proposal.
- Assembly Budget Priorities: Earlier today, Assembly Budget Committee Chair, Phil Ting, provided an update on the Assembly Democrats' budget priorities as the June 15th constitutional deadline to approve next year's budget approaches. As expected, recovery from the coronavirus pandemic continues to be a key priority moving into next year. Specifically, the Assembly Democrats' Budget Priorities call for the following COVID-19 recovery items:
 - o Funding to vaccinate Californians and prepare for new variants
 - Re-opening schools for the fall
 - Provide transitional resources to families and businesses to help with the State's re-opening
 - Early care and education: 1 million slots by 2025, and universal TK starting in 2021
 - \$20 billion over five years for homelessness prevention
 - Expand the Golden State Stimulus, which was approved earlier this year, and increase grant levels
 - Expand job training opportunities to help re-engage the workforce in high paying jobs
 - Increase the production of affordable housing
- California Alignment on CDC Outdoor Mask Guidance: Yesterday, Governor Newsom and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) highlighted their alignment and support of the CDC's new recommendation that those fully vaccinated are not required to wear masks in certain outdoor settings.
 - The decision to align with CDC guidance on relaxing masking requirements is further reinforced by the fact that California has administered more than 28 million vaccine doses, including almost 6 million to those who live in our hardesthit communities.
 - CDPH is working to align California regulations and sectoral guidance to reflect this.
- California Small Business Relief Grant Round 6: Today marks the opening of Round 6 of the California Small Business Relief grant, which provides funding to eligible small businesses and non-profits. The program will be accepting applications until May 4th at 5:00pm.
 - Round 6 represents the final round of funding, unless the Legislature and Administration allocate additional funding to the program through the State Budget.
 - Eligible applicants that were waitlisted in a previous round do no need to reapply, as their applications will automatically roll-over and be eligible for funding.

- California Business Tax Breaks on Forgiven PPP Loans: On Monday, the State Legislature approved another piece of the COVID-19 economic recovery package, which will provide up to \$6.8 billion in state tax breaks for California businesses.
 - Assembly Bill 80, which was negotiated between the Legislature and the Governor's administration, will allow businesses to avoid paying state taxes on forgiven loans from the federal Paycheck Protection Program and to deduct expenses paid for using the loan funds.
 - Tax breaks will apply to up to 85% of the more than 1 million California businesses that received a combined \$97 billion in federal loans, averaging about \$96,700 each.
 - The bill is currently awaiting the Governor's consideration. He is expected to sign AB 80 into law.

May 5, 2021 Update

- Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) Funds Exhausted: The federal PPP, run by the Small Business Administration, has run out of money for most borrowers before its planned May 31 end.
 - Going forward, the program will only accept new applications from Community Financial Institutions.
 - Roughly \$8 billion in funding was set aside for such businesses.
 - The SBA will continue to fund outstanding approved PPP applications from other lenders but will not accept any new applicants.
 - There are other relief programs available through the SBA, including some that also give grants to businesses, including:
 - The SBA's <u>Restaurant Revitalization Fund</u>, which began accepting applications on Monday.
 - The program was established in March and was allocated \$28.6 billion in funding. In the first 21 days, the SBA will only approve applications from small businesses owned by women, veterans or socially and economically disadvantaged people. Subsequently, it will open up to all eligible applicants.
- California Courts Uphold Governor's Emergency Powers: A California appeals court today affirmed Governor Newsom's use of emergency powers when he issued an Executive Order laying forth the procedures for conducting an all-mail election. The decision by the 3rd Court of Appeals overturned an earlier ruling by the Sutter County Superior Court.
 - The Court of Appeals found that the Governor's Executive Order complied with the state's Emergency Services Act, which gives the Governor expanded powers in extreme circumstances.
 - The original case against the Governor was brought by Republican Assembly Members Kevin Kiley and James Gallagher who claimed that the Governor had unconstitutionally used executive action when determining how the state would conduct elections. The Assembly Members contended that a Governor, even in times of emergency, is not allowed to create legislation.
- Judge Rules Against National Eviction Moratorium: Earlier today, a judge at the US
 District Court for the District of Columbia ruled that the Centers for Disease Control and
 Prevention's national eviction moratorium, aimed at helping those impacted by the

coronavirus pandemic stay in their homes, exceeds the agency's authority and should be vacated.

- o It is unclear what the impact of today's ruling will be. The current national eviction moratorium is scheduled to remain in place until June 30th.
- The Justice Department has already issued a statement indicating that they
 disagree with the judge's opinion. Additionally, the Justice Department has
 already filed a notice of appeal of the decision and has indicated they intend to
 seek an emergency stay of the order pending the appeal.
- The national eviction moratorium was first put into place in the CARES Act, signed by President Trump last March. The moratorium then expired in July and was put back into place by an order from the CDC in September. The order has been further extended by the CDC to its current June 30th date.
- **CDPH Updates Mask Guidance:** On Monday, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) updated its November 16, 2020 <u>face coverings guidance</u> to align with the latest CDC guidance.
 - Face coverings are not required outdoors except when attending crowded outdoor events when physical distancing is not possible.
 - For small outdoor gatherings, fully vaccinated persons are not required to wear face coverings while unvaccinated persons do.
 - Regardless of vaccination status, face coverings are required indoors with a few exceptions.
- **Updated Guidance for Fully Vaccinated Persons:** CDPH also updated the April 15, 2021 <u>guidance for fully vaccinated persons</u>.
 - The new guidance clarifies that Cal/OSHA COVID-19 Prevention Emergency Temporary Standards related to the quarantine of fully vaccinated individuals applies to workplaces that are not healthcare settings.
 - Fully vaccinated people can spend time with other fully vaccinated persons from a single household who are at low-risk for severe COVID-19 disease, including indoors, without wearing a face covering or physically distancing.
