Why it Matters

\$300 billion

Low literacy costs the US economy over \$300 billion in lost earnings, lower workplace productivity, higher crime, and more government assistance.

Employers in 4 surveyed industries that rely on low-skilled jobs see the impact of adult low literacy.

Read Santa Clara


- In 1995, the Santa Clara County Reading Program began offering adult literacy tutoring at the Santa Clara City Library
- In 2000, the adult literacy program became an integral service of the Santa Clara City Library and was named Read Santa Clara, with 2.5 coded positions
- Read Santa Clara currently offers four services:
 - Adult literacy
 - Family Literacy
 - ESL
 - Career Online High School






Adult Literacy Services

In 2024-2025, RSC's trained volunteer tutors served 99 adult learners, 1:1 and small groups, in person and virtually.










Family Literacy Services

In 2024-25, RSC held 64 family literacy events at the library and at 7 state preschool classes at 4 school sites










ESL Services

16.7% of residents in the City of Santa Clara are unable to speak English well.

- Small group and 1:1 tutoring for ESL learners at beginning levels
- Tutoring offered at the library and at school sites









Career Online High School (COHS)




- Scholarships given to those,19 and over, who live or work in Santa Clara and seek to get a high school diploma and a career certificate
- 8 have graduated in past year. Currently, we have 13 COHS students, 3-5 anticipated to graduate this year



The Power of Volunteerism

61 volunteers gave over 3000 volunteer hours helping learners in the adult literacy, family literacy and ESL programs









Outcomes



- Over 70% of adult learners served each year have met a goal they set for themselves
- All adult learners are encouraged to get library cards, many using the library for first time.
- Families of adult learners read together and develop a love for the library.
- Read Santa Clara bridges the literacy and digital divide creating lasting community connections
- Innovative projects developed by RSC staff have been adopted statewide. They include the tutor training videos project, the Adult Learner Leadership Institute and the Adult New Reader Books initiative





Challenges and Opportunities ahead...

- California Library Literacy Services(CLLS) grant for ESL sunsets in June 2026
- The ESL program has recently been selected for grant award from VTA (for FY 2026-2027) through SCCLFF for creating awareness among ESL learners about public transit
- We continue to seek grants and donations to sustain and enhance RSC's services in future years
- Read Santa Clara will develop a strategic plan in 2025-2026, aligned the library's strategic plan
