Overview

- In 2026, Levi's Stadium is anticipated to host
 - o Super Bowl LX in February
 - Six FIFA World Cup 2026 matches between June 13 July 1
- On February 22, 2022, City Council voted in favor of a resolution to support the City's bid to host one or more FIFA games
- On June 16, 2022, FIFA announced the 16 regions that will host FWC26: Canada (2 locations), Mexico (3 locations), and the United States (11 locations)
- On May 23, 2023, City Council and Stadium Authority Board voted in favor of a resolution:
 - Adopt the Santa Clara City Council Guiding Principles for FWC26
 - Direct the City Manager/Executive Director and City Attorney/Stadium Authority Counsel to negotiate and execute an Information Sharing and Event Cooperation Agreement

Overview (cont.)

- On May 22, 2023, the NFL announced that Super Bowl LX is planned to be played at Levi's Stadium
- On September 26, 2023, City Staff (Staff), Santa Clara Stadium Authority (Stadium Authority) presented an Informational Report on FWC26 Updates
- On February 4, 2024, FIFA announced the match schedule for FWC26 at Levi's Stadium (6 matches)
- On March 5, 2024, Staff, Stadium Authority, and the Bay Area Host Committee (BAHC) presented an Informational Report on Super Bowl LX and FWC26 Updates
 - Staff made two recommendations that were unanimously approved by City Council/Stadium Authority Board:
 - Note and file informational report on Super Bowl LX and FWC26 updates; and,
 - Adopt the Super Bowl LX Guiding Principles
 - Staff and Stadium Authority committed to providing a periodic Informational Report update for 2026 Major Events

FWC26 Overview

The FIFA World Cup and FIFA Women's World Cup are international soccer competitions between national teams under FIFA, the sport's global governing body. Held every four years, they are the most prestigious and widely viewed single sporting events in the world

On June 16, 2022, FIFA announced the 16 regions that will host matches for World Cup

- 1. Atlanta (Mercedes-Benz Stadium)
- 2. Boston (Gillette Stadium)
- 3. Dallas (AT&T Stadium)
- 4. Guadalajara, Mexico (Estadio Akron)
- 5. Houston (NRG Stadium)
- 6. Kansas City (Arrowhead Stadium)
- 7. Los Angeles (SoFi Stadium)
- Mexico City, Mexico (Estadio Azteca)

- Miami (Hard Rock Stadium)
- 10. Monterrey, Mexico (Estadio BBVA)

FWC26 Overview (cont.)

On February 4, 2024, FIFA announced the match schedule for FWC26

Group Matches

- 48 teams
- 12 "groups" of 4 teams each
- Top 2 from each group and top 8 third place teams advance

Knockout Matches

- 32 teams
- · Single elimination
- Final on July 19 at New York/New Jersey Stadium



<u>Levi's Stadium</u> is scheduled to host six (6) matches over a 19-day period

- Group Matches: June 13, 16, 19, 22 and 25
- Knockout Match: July 1, 2026
- ★ Teams assigned to Levi's Stadium still to be determined. Each matchup will be evaluated for public safety risk.



SBLX Overview

The Super Bowl is the NFL's annual championship game, generally played on the second Sunday in February

On May 22, 2023, the NFL announced Super Bowl LX is scheduled to be held at Levi's Stadium

★ Article 21 of the Stadium Lease between SCSA and StadCo contemplates Super Bowls at the Stadium, with terms to be implemented through a "League Event Agreement"



Current Status of Negotiations

The City and Stadium Authority are currently in active negotiations with BAHC, StadCo/Stadium Manager ("Niners Entities"), and FIFA regarding allocation of costs and benefits for FWC26 events. BAHC has agreed to reimburse the City for event planning costs through an Interim Funding Agreement. More comprehensive negotiations are ongoing for the terms of the formal Assignment and Assumption Agreement (FWC26) and League Event Agreement (Super Bowl 60).

Status of Agreements

- ✓ Interim Funding Agreement
- Assignment and Assumption Agreement (pending; target completion date October 2024).
- League Event Agreement (pending; target completion date October 2024).



Interim Funding Agreement Terms

Effective Date & Duration

- o Effective July 1, 2024
- Unless extended, terminates on earlier to occur of December 31, 2024, or upon execution of the Assignment and Assumption Agreement

Purpose

- Covers reimbursement by BAHC of City costs related to FWC26 planning until full Assignment and Assumption Agreement is negotiated
- Interim "trial period" gets City reimbursed and gives parties opportunity to identify and resolve issues

Financial Limit

 Agreement covers first \$150k of expenses, with an amendment required to increase; parties to meet and confer at \$125K to discuss terms for increase

Budgeting & Reporting

- City developed an Initial Estimated Cost Allocation for staffing costs (detailed in Exhibit A
- City will track actual costs, provide written expenditure reports to BAHC, and summarize related activities

Interim Funding Agreement Terms (cont.)

Limited Time Arrangement

- Ensures City costs are covered while finalizing the Assignment and Assumption Agreement
- Reimbursement Coverage
 - o BAHC reimburses City for expenses related to Event Planning Work
 - Eligible costs include police, fire, public works staffing, and other FWC26 planning costs



Staff Time & Reimbursement

Tracked Pre-Interim Funding Agreement Costs From May 22, 2023 to June 30, 2024

City and Stadium Authority reclassified general staff time into specific FWC26 and SBLX-related activities from May 22, 2023, to June 30, 2024. Time has been tracked by month and by staff member

Total Staff Hours & Costs:

- Total Hours: 1,327 approximate hours costing \$328,281
 - SBLX Activities: 743 approximate hours costing \$187,265
 - <u>FWC26 Activities:</u> 584 approximate hours costing \$141,017

Non-SCSA Budgeted Staff Hours & Costs:

- Total Hours: 590 approximate hours costing \$148,930
 - SBLX Activities: 485 approximate hours costing \$124,086
 - <u>FWC26 Activities:</u> 106 approximate hours costing \$24,845

Cost Reimbursement

- City and Stadium Authority are in negotiations with BAHC to determine available funding sources for these costs
- Amounts not funded by BAHC, state or other sources to be reimbursed by the Stadium Authority

Staff Time & Reimbursement (cont.)

Tracking Staff Costs starting July 1, 2024 through the end of SBLX and FWC26 events

Measure J prohibits the use of City funds for Stadium Authority costs, including operating and maintenance expenses

Updated City Manager's Directive (CMD 136)

- Outlines staff's timekeeping responsibilities and City-wide reimbursement procedures
- Ensures accurate reporting of City services provided to the San Francisco Forty Niners entities, Stadium Authority, and Levi's Stadium support
- Update provides additional clarification on City services that should be tracked and reported
- Dilineates direct Stadium event costs as it relates to public safety, from administrative and management time




Staff Time & Reimbursement (cont.)

Staff developed comprehensive, streamlined approach to timekeeping while minimizing administrative overhead

- √ Timecodes were assigned by department, with an emphasis on existing timekeeping practices
- Meeting agenda templates with pre-assigned time codes per attendee and department
- Comprehensive descriptions per timecode task
- ✓ Invoices are to be sent monthly

Emergency Preparedness

- Provided update to Emergency Operational Area Council (EOAC) on SBLX and FWC planning (August 2024)
 - Council includes elected officials and public safety leaders
 - Joint City OES and County OEM high-level briefing
- 2024 National Homeland Security Conference and FIFA Host City Planning Meeting attendance (July 2024)
 - Nearly all host cities were represented, with reps from Law, Fire, and EM
 - Exchanged best practices in incident management and large event management
 - Paid for by Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) grant funding

Emergency Preparedness (cont.)

- FWC26/SBLX Op Area Emergency Management Kickoff Meeting (July 2024)
 - In-depth briefing to all jurisdictional EM partners, PG&E, Water District, NWS, and SF DEM
 - Discussed past event management, expected planning timelines, and potential complications
- Department of Homeland Security FWC26/SBLX Critical Infrastructure Collab. (June 2024)
 - Met with our DHS Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) Protective Security Advisor (PSA) to begin various assessments and future training planning



Emergency Preparedness (cont.)

- Department of Homeland Security (DHS) FWC Host City Emergency Communications Planning Symposium (May 2024)
 - Met with all other FWC host city EMs, Dispatch and radio reps, and IT/Cybersecurity reps
 - Discussed emergency comms plans & best practices, & received briefing from FIFA safety reps
 - Paid for by DHS Critical Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA)
- City Cybersecurity Tabletop Exercise (TTX) with federal, state, & local partners (April 2024)






Bowl/Field Modification

Modifications to the inner bowl are required by FIFA to allow for an expanded field pitch

- · NFL dimensions (red)
- · FIFA dimensions (green)

Items not shown include; player warmup areas and benches, personnel and operations staff, media, security and LED ribbon boards





Bowl/Field Modification

FIFA Compliance Modifications:


- The inner bowl modifications (Quadrants A, B, C, and D) must be expanded to accommodate the pitch area per FIFA standards
- Modified sections will be replaced with demountable steel structures for flexibility in future events





Bowl/Field Modification

- The stadium manager submitted a permit to remove 3 rows of general seating (Quadrants C and D) and a row
 of ADA seating (Quadrants A and B), which will be relocated to a slightly higher section of the lower bowl
- The proposed design preserves the existing look and feel of the bowl, ensuring minimal aesthetic impact

Construction is planned for late January 2025, with all costs fully reimbursed by BAHC

FWC26 Ongoing Negotiations

Assignment and Assumption Agreement

- Premise: BAHC to assume all Stadium Authority Obligations under the FIFA Stadium Agreement in Consideration of Receiving all Stadium "Rent Revenues" paid by FIFA for the Event
- BACH obligations include reimbursement of City Public Safety Costs:
- Current estimated costs include:
 - Public safety
 planning costs
 estimate: \$3,148,000
 - Public safety <u>direct</u>
 <u>event costs</u>: \$8,424,000

- Key terms under negotiation include:
 - Process for invoicing and receiving timely reimbursement
 - o Terms for reimbursement of necessary public safety equipment
 - Financial assurances that cost reimbursements will be available when and in amounts needed
 - o Cooperative efforts to pursue Federal and State event funding
 - Implementation of Required Field Improvements (to be reimbursed by BAHC)
 - Amount and available uses of facility fee ticket "surcharge" to be collected and paid to Stadium Authority
 - Definition and terms for financial offset of "opportunity costs" created by displacement of potential money-making events during the "non-exclusive" and "exclusive" FWC26 operating period
 - o Terms for use of the City's Convention Center
 - o Accounting mechanisms and audit rights
 - Implementing Agreements for BAHC "Host City" obligations for which they may seek/need SCSA/City support

SBLX Ongoing Negotiations

League Event Agreement

- Premise: As contemplated by Article 21 of the Stadium Lease, the BAHC shall assume all
 cost and obligations to host SBLX, including the obligation to reimburse City for all
 planning and event support costs
- Key Terms Under Negotiation:
 - · Definition of services to be provided and process for invoicing and reimbursement
 - Financial assurances that reimbursements will be available when and in amounts needed
 - · Process for developing security plan in accordance with NFL and City requirements
 - · Stadium Authority approval of required improvements
 - Term (period covered by the agreement)
 - · Specific financial and community benefits

It is imperative that the process discussed in the Informational Report on Super Bowl LX and the World Cup[be slowed down before it is too late.

First, the Council should demand an accounting of all of the Stadium Authority dollars that have gone toward bringing the World Cup, including all of Al Guido's travel and entertainment expenditures. The accounting should also include all of the staff time in negotiating anything to do with the World Cup. Without reimbursement of all of these costs, the public will be subsidizing an event that will make the Stadium Authority no money in 2026. The report sets forth a substantial amount of staff time and travel expenditures that it admits have already not been reimbursed. By making these expenditures the City Manager appears to have violated Measure J. This violation should be investigated and a complete accounting and repayment should be completed.

Second, the public should be made aware of all of the lost opportunity costs of potential money-making events that will not be able to be held in 2026 by reason of assigning rights to the Stadium to the Bay Area Host Committee and FIFA.

Lastly, given that the public safety costs for holding the World Cup must all be run through the City's budget, there must be an honest, transparent projection of these costs and how they will be paid by the Bay Area Host Committee. Given what the other World Cup cities have discussed, these costs could be expected to be in the tens of millions of dollars. The Bay Area Host Committee is a nonprofit with past financial statements that indicate that its only source of significant revenue has been from the 49ers. Why would Santa Clara assign the millions of dollars in rent to be paid by FIFA to a nonprofit with such shaky finances, in the hopes that it could raise enough revenue to then reimburse it for the public safety costs that it must pay if the event is to occur in Santa Clara?

At a minimum, if Santa Clara is expected to follow through on the promises made by an NFL team valued at \$6 Billion, it should receive an ironclad guarantee from that team's owner that the City will receive the financial reimbursements for its efforts. Demanding nothing less is a betrayal of Santa Clara taxpayers.

In completing these recommendations, the following questions should be answered:

Who paid for the City expenses already incurred?

How much of these expenses have been reimbursed?

By the Stadium Authority funds?

By the Bay Area Host Committee?

By the "49er entities"?

The report refers to an Assignment and Assumption Agreement but does not explain what agreement or agreements are proposed to be assigned. What are these?

When will the public be able to see unredacted copies of these?

Does City staff expect to publicly approve an assignment agreement without telling the public what is in the agreements?

The report completely avoids explaining what the Bay Area Host Committee is and provides no written record of their commitments or agreements. Public information about entities using this name are all nonprofit corporations whose tax returns show comparatively little revenue with which to guarantee payment of the magnitude of City expenses expected for these events.

What due diligence has staff completed to ensure that the City will not be left holding the bag if the BAHC does not have the ability to pay after the City has paid tax dollars toward this effort?

Why has the public been left in the dark, while City staff spends taxpayer dollars meeting behind closed doors with people who have glaringly violated state conflict of interest law?

It's high time to stop treating City residents as if they are stupid.
