- 7b. Briefly describe the present *physical description* of the site or structure and describe any major alterations from its original condition:

This structure is a 1½ story wooden residence designed in a rectangular plan in a Craftsman Bungalow style. The simple gabled roof is punctuated by a centrally lo located shed dormer and a interior located brick chimney. The roofline angles slightly uppard as it extends beyond the facade to form a long covered entry porch. A row of rafters over the entry porch accents the craftsman detailing of the house. The porch itself is supported by four squared pillars each set upon a large wooden base. The roof is sheathed in asbestos shingles while the rest of the structure is sheathed in ship lap wooden siding. Fenestration tends to be simple, rectangular—shaped with double hung windows (with the above light distinctively multipaned). A small horizontal window of four lights accents the dormer. The entrance door is recessed and outlined by side lights. A detatched rear garage is found on the southwest side of the residence. There appear to be no major alterations.

SIG 19.	Briefly state historical and/or architectural importance (include dates, events, and persons associated with the site.) This structure is the best remaining example of the New Park Subdivision which was developed in 1908 and includes the entire blocks between Harrison Street and Benton Street and between Lincoln Street and Pierce Street. A small portion of the subdivision includes all of the residences on the west side of Pierce Street between Harrison and Benton. The houses reflect their original design as a small early 20t century subdivision constructed in the popular bungalow styles with craftsman motifs predominating. Other cottage styles from the subdivision include stucco bungalows such as #1236 Lincoln St. Spanish Colonial Revival cottages such as #1110 Lincoln; and Period Recical cottages such as #1262 Lincoln. Although many of the residences have been altered by subsequent owners a concentration of original designs remains on Benton Street (#117591163), on Lincoln Street (#1110-1194); and on Fremont Street (#1658,1692,1712, 1716, 1756, 1778 & 1798 with the most prominent being #1700).
