Dear Mayor, Council and Planning Commission,

Thank you for all the great work you do.

Both these locations are great for High Density Housing. High Density housing means bigger impact on resources.

The developers make a fortune off our rapidly disappearing land. They directly cause the need for more schools. But they do not pay and they are very good at avoiding the issue. During the public input time, they spent exactly 3 minutes talking about the schools. The majority of the 5 hours was about the cost of the developers investment. The developers had all their "facts and figures" ready. The Planning Commision tried to evaluate the developer's "numbers" but was clearly outgunned. A few Audubon people tried to fight the developers but they were equally unequipped and out numbered. Our CAC (Citizens Action Committee) was no where to be found. Your commission is doing the heavy lifting trying to defend the objectives of the citizens of this city, but someone asked why we do not get a profit and cost analysis from the developers. I think it was the City Clerk who said, "we are not in a position to ask this of the developers", I find it odd that we are only allowed to hear about the developer's expenses but not their profits? One person brought up formaldehyde, He was completely ignored. The traffic issue at Coleman was similarly dismissed. The developers complained about the necessity of having open space and the cost. The developers propose 2 acres out 45 acres with ~5 thousand units and the riparian setback at Tasman, impact fees were mentioned by the developer but I did not hear of any. These are issues that need through study. The developers need to build now and we need the housing. These are not afterthoughts that are to be discussed at 11 pm on a week night with no community present. I believe we have very hardworking, bright, high integrity people leading our city. We can do better than this with the citizens help and input. I am urging the people on Nextdoor to watch the videos of the meetings. In other major cities, the developers must produce a complete cost/profit balance sheet before the permits are issued. We need more transparency on the projected costs and profits of these developments.

There ae several points I would like to share especially on why Brokaw Rd should be brought into Benton by use of an additional road with underpass/overpass with regards to the rail system/upcoming BART system.

Dear Planning Commission

Great discussion expected tonight—I will be watching the live stream. Lots of changes expected around our Historic Downtown. Glad to see that Brokaw reopening is being considered as a long term solution to the existing gridlock on Coleman.

As a core lead for Reclaiming our Downtown, Historic Landmark Commissioner, resident of the Old Quad—its Safe to say I have concerns but also see great opportunities for our Historic Downtown.

Brokaw was once an open road to Benton. In the 60s the decision was made to close it to encourage travel along Dela Cruz. We now have way to much travel on Dela Cruz and Coleman.

Timing is right to reverse that decision but more importantly to support a long term solution for the numerous developments in the pipeline for the surrounding area.

With the BART train and its high density transit oriented development proposed for Santa Clara Station, the 1600 unit Hunter Storm development on Coleman and numerous others along the El Camino—opening access to Brokaw to Santa Clara Historic Downtown makes absolute sense.

Access Benefits:

- 1) Enable traffic intended for Santa Clara Downtown, SCU, Old Quad and Campbell Ave neighborhoods to break sooner from the airport and regular commuter traffic. Better flow for the rest of the commuters.
- 2) Public safety—more direct routes by SCPD SCFD in responding to emergencies from nearby stations to Coleman Ave
- —save time and save lives. Too many risks for emergencies/ accidents with the interchange of 880, 101 and 280 HWYS and the nearby Airport and Avaya Stadium—very few quick ways for emergencies respondents to cut through the Gridlock.
- 3) New Revenue opportunities for SC Historic Downtown. Right now Santa Clara Downtown is not accessible to most commuters on Coleman. One entry point to Santa Clara off Coleman is not working. If you can't see it it might as well not exist—but we can fix that!

Brokaw Road is a Historic exit to the Santa Clara Downtown—proper signage on the reopened road provides new access, directs new visitors and revenues from the airport/Avaya Stadium events to the SC Downtown.

In summary

It's a Win win long term for Public safety, will improve commute for SC bound visitors and residents and increase revenues for the Historic Downtown.
