

Background



- Council was considering a Cannabis tax to generate revenue for the City—roughly estimated to generate \$1.2 \$2.4 million/annually
- Cannabis tax revenue has not met projections at State or local levels
- Significant resources required to implement cannabis program. (e.g. PD, Fire, Finance, CAO and CMO) offset to revenues
- Costs from non-licensed activity cannot be recovered
- February 11, 2020 Council opted to pursue other revenue strategies and directed staff to prepare a non-temporary ban on all commercial cannabis activity.
- Current temporary ban ends on June 30, 2020.

Planning Commission Action 4/8/20

- Multiple comments expressed at meeting:
 - Concern over lost revenue opportunity
 - Access to cannabis by youth
 - Conflict w/ DARE program promoted by City
 - Suggested limiting commercial uses to 3 retail storefronts to reduce overhead and enforcement costs
- PC ultimately supported a commercial cannabis ban ordinance until 2/28/2021, at which point Council will need to revisit ban.

Proposed Ordinance

- Amends two sections of Chapter 18.102 ("Regulation of Marijuana")
 of Title 18 ("Zoning") of "The Code of the City of Santa Clara,
 California."
 - The proposed amendment to Section 18.102.010 ("Commercial Marijuana Activity Prohibited") would prohibit all commercial cannabis activity in Santa Clara.
 - The proposed amendment to Section 18.102.030 ("Transport and Delivery of Marijuana") would also prohibit marijuana delivery services <u>originating</u> in Santa Clara. The amendment would also modify references in these sections and the chapter to use the term "Cannabis" in place of "Marijuana", consistent with current practices, and add a definition of "Cannabis" to Chapter 18.06 ("Definitions")

- Do not approve introduction Ordinance amending Chapters 18.06 ("Definitions") and 18.102 ("Regulation of Marijuana") of Title 18 ("Zoning") of "The Code of the City of Santa Clara, California" to prohibit all commercial cannabis activity; or
- Approve introduction of Ordinance amending Chapters 18.06 ("Definitions") and 18.102 ("Regulation of Marijuana") of Title 18 ("Zoning") of "The Code of the City of Santa Clara, California" to prohibit all commercial cannabis activity with an added sunset clause that would cause the commercial cannabis ban to expire on February 28, 2021 (Version 2) as recommended by the Planning Commission.


