Open outdoors with modifications (closed indoors):

- > Gatherings of up to 3 households (see Mandatory Directive on Capacity Limitations for gatherings for political, religious, or ceremonial purposes)
- > Adult recreation activities (For activities that are no-contact)
- > Professional and collegiate sports (see Mandatory Directive on Collegiate and Professional Athletics)

Open outdoors with modifications (closed indoors):

- > Dining
- > Wineries
- > Bars, breweries, and distilleries serving food

Open indoors at 20% capacity:

- > Personal care services
(e.g. hair salons and barber shops; nail care; body art, tattoo, and piercing shops; esthetician, skin care, and cosmetology services; electrology, waxing, threading, and other hair removal services)

Still in effect:



- **Mandatory Directive on Travel**
(requires most people who travel into the county from more than 150 miles away to quarantine for 10 days upon their arrival)
- **Mandatory Directive for Lodging Facilities**
(Lodging facilities may not provide lodging services for non-essential purposes, such as tourism, recreational, or leisure purposes)
