Study Session on the California Department of Housing and Community Development's (HCD) Project HomeKey

July 13, 2021

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Overview

BACKGROUND

- In July 2020, HCD announced the Project HomeKey Program
- \$600 million to purchase and rehab housing, including hotels, motels, vacant apartment buildings, and convert them into interim housing
- The purpose of the program was to expand housing options for homeless persons who are at high-risk for serious illness
- By December 2020, Project HomeKey had resulted in the acquisition of 94 projects, representing 6,000 units of housing for individuals experiencing homelessness



Overview

DISCUSSION

- In January of 2021, the Governor's proposed FY21-22 budget included another \$750 million allocation for Project Homekey 2.0
- Funding and Program Guidelines have yet to be approved; however, approval and a new call for applications is expected this Fall
- Study Session will provide an overview of Project HomeKey 1.0, focusing on a case study of the LifeMoves Mountain View project
- Staff is also seeking input on the City Council's potential interest for the City of Santa Clara to possibly participate in Project Homekey 2.0

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Project HomeKey 1.0

OVERVIEW

- Grant amounts: \$600 million total; \$91 million Bay Area (July 2020)
- Grant Funds must be expended by December 30, 2020
- <u>Applicants:</u> Cities, counties, or any other Local Public Entity (partner with housing development sponsor)
- <u>Target Population:</u> Households experiencing or at risk of homelessness and impacted by COVID19.
- <u>Priority:</u> Housing projects that can be occupied 90 days from the time the property is acquired



Project HomeKey 1.0

TIMELINE

- Key Dates from 2020:
 - Priority application period: July 16th August 13th
 - Final applications due: September 29th
 - Final Awards: October 2020
 - Close of Escrow: December 2020
- Grant Amounts:
 - Capital: \$100k-\$200k per door; Operating: \$1k per month per door

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Project HomeKey 1.0

STRENGTHS

- SPEED (6 months, awards expended by December 30, 2020)
- COST EFFICIENCY (\$125 -\$150k per unit)
- SUBSIDY: All Projects can request up to \$100K per door; \$200k max
- LAND USE STREAMLINING
- INTERIM HOUSING SOLUTION
- VARIETY OF ELIGIBLE USES

- LOCATION / PROJECT SITING
- TIMING
- COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT
- NO REVENUE SOURCES
- OPERATING COSTS

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



- Pre-pandemic, the homeless crisis continued to grow and became more visible

- · Consider the potential wave of coming evictions
- Homekey 1.0 was an opportunity to increase interim supportive housing capacity in our communities
- Proof Point: LifeMoves and City of Mountain View awarded Project Homekey Aug. 2020 — Open now





Capital Funds

Project Homekey awards cover all capital

- Land

\$5M

- Buildings

\$4M

- Development \$8M

Total: \$17M

= \$170k/door based on 100 units

Operating Funds

Annual Operating Cost: \$3.5M

Cost per bed/night: \$96

Potential sources of operating funds: A combination of Public and Private Funds. Federal, State, County, City, Corporate, Foundation and Individuals

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Santa Clara | A Willing Municipality

The annual cost of leaving a persistently unsheltered person on our streets is \$83,000*. According to the 2019 point-intime count, the City of Santa Clara **had 264 unsheltered people**, incurring a share of that cost burden each year.


Communities making real progress on lowering the homeless population all have one thing in common -- **Commitment of leadership**.

Public (and private) **leaders must see ending homelessness as an important goal**, speak about it publicly, encourage collaboration and commitment from the community at large.




Physical structure designs are critical from the start and throughout the project. LifeMoves will provide:

A plan or roadmap for exiting homelessness and achieving housing is created by the case manager and the client.

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




How We Do It
