Police need to have better training in mental health issues, poverty, drug, and juvenile issues. Language training so that officers can communicate clearly to those who speak Spanish, Mandarin, etc. Take a close look at the reform in New Jersey and other places. Don't reinvent the wheel.

8. What systems or policies do you think your Councilmembers should consider revising or changing as the city works towards diversity, equity, and inclusion?

We need to address the homeless population and their needs. It isn't one bandaid fits all. Some have lost their jobs or their jobs are low paying and they've lost their housing because the prices are astronomical. Some are drug addicts and need safe places and programs to help. The price of a house in our area precludes equity if truth be told. Diverse people cannot afford to live in Santa Clara for the most part.

Plan events where the whole community is invited and you get your inclusion. The September Wine and Art Festival is one. Christmas tree lighting and gift giving from Santa for those in need. A Santa Clara Turkey trot. The summer concerts in City Park are all good venues to get the community out. Something at the library where families bring the kids. Covid has stopped a lot of what was good and going on.
